#### **Foreword**

At Conservation Through Public Health (CTPH), we believe that the well-being of both wildlife and people are deeply intertwined, and nowhere is this connection more evident than at Bwindi Impenetrable National Park. Mountain gorillas are threatened by disease from closely genetically related humans, loss of habitat and injuries from snares and spears through poaching for other wild animals including duikers and bush pigs as well as climate change. The Bwindi Cards are a crucial tool in advancing our shared mission of protecting the mountain gorillas and the forest ecosystem while uplifting the communities living around the park.
